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
What is the CCRC?

August Conversations With Barry

CCRC hosted it's second "Conversations" event on August 11th. Barry Loudermilk was the invited elected official to give an update on what is hot in Washington DC.

He began with the status of the "January 6" investigations. With new committee chairmanship and committeemen, it was disturbing to hear that significant data from prior hearings and testimonies have yet to be located and that which has been located was filed in disarray.

Barry next addressed the administration's plans for digital currency, which he opposes since we already have digital transactions using the dollar currency.

The congressman next expressed concerns about China's global expansion, both physical and financial, wherein developing countries are offered infrastructure, ports, airports in exchange for land used to base China's military and concerns about China's buying of US farmland, food

processing plants, and other strategic companies.

The next topic discussed was the "Biden Brand" and other controversies arising in the current administration. All investigations are occurring methodically to result in factbased conclusions that may lead to further constitutional processes. Media releases are being properly controlled versus how the prior committee members would try to beat each other to reporters to divulge sensitive and/ or false information as soon as investigative committees adjourned.

Lastly, Barry took questions from attendees regarding his office's ability to help with passport processing, Congress' work to curb/limit Executive Orders, lawless border policies and activity, and the US support for Ukraine.



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United States Nicknamed "Uncle Sam"

On September 7, 1813, the United States got its nickname, Uncle Sam. The name is linked to Samuel Wilson, a meat packer from Troy, New York, who supplied barrels of beef to the United States Army during the War of 1812.Wilson (1766-1854) stamped the barrels with "U.S." for United States, but soldiers began referring to the grub as "Uncle Sam's." The local newspaper picked up on the story and Uncle Sam eventually gained widespread acceptance as the nickname for the U.S. federal government.

In the late 1860s and 1870s, political cartoonist Thomas Nast (1840-1902) began popularizing the image of Uncle Sam. Nast continued to evolve the image, eventually giving Sam the white beard and stars-and-stripes suit that are associated with the character today. The German-born Nast was also credited with creating the modern image of Santa Claus as well as coming up with the donkey as a symbol for the Democratic Party and the elephant as a symbol for the Republicans. Nast also famously lampooned the corruption of New York City's Tammany Hall in his editorial cartoons and was, in part, responsible for the downfall of Tammany leader William Tweed.

Perhaps the most famous image of Uncle Sam was created by artist James Montgomery Flagg (1877-1960). In Flagg's version, Uncle Sam wears a tall top hat and blue jacket and is pointing straight ahead at the viewer. During World War I, this portrait of Sam with the words "I Want You For The U.S. Army" was used as a recruiting poster. The image, which became immensely popular, was first used on the cover of Leslie's Weekly in July 1916 with the title "What Are You Doing for Preparedness?" The poster was widely distributed and has subsequently been re-used numerous times with different captions.

In September 1961, the U.S. Congress recognized Samuel Wilson as "the progenitor of America's national symbol of Uncle Sam." Wilson died at age 88 in 1854, and was buried next to his wife Betsey Mann in the Oakwood Cemetery in Troy, New York, the town that calls itself "The Home of Uncle Sam."

- September 5, 1774 The First Continental Congress assembled in Philadelphia.
- September 13, 1788 New York City became the Capitol of the United States. I bet you didn't know that!
- September 16, 1620 The Mayflower set sail from Plymouth, England. It carried pilgrims headed to the New World, to escape religious persecution.
- September 22, 1862 President Abraham Lincoln declared the Emancipation Proclamation.
- September 24, 1493 With a fleet of 17 ships, Christopher Columbus set sail on his second expedition to the New World.
- September 25, 1789 The New U.S. Congress proposed the Bill of Rights.



- September 11, 1941 Construction of the Pentagon began in Arlington, VA.
- September 11, 1959 Congress passed a bill authorizing food stamps for low-income Americans.
- September 11, 1962 The Beatles recorded their first single "Love Me Do". (1962)
- September 11, 1967 "The "Carol Burnett Show" premiered on television.
- September 11, 2001 Islamic Al-Qaeda militants flew planes into NYC's twin World Trade Towers and the Pentagon.
